you will find the new 42¢ commemorative stamp attached (at right). Our goal is to include "something special" with every issue of PARticulars. We hope you will send a card or letter to "someone special" using this stamp. The stamp is attached using a "glue dot" with easy release adhesive.

On May 17, 2008, the Postal Service™ issued this 42¢ commemorative stamp, Minnesota Statehood. The ceremony was held on the grounds of the Capitol during the Sesquicentennial Festival. The Postal Service commemorates the 150th year of Minnesota's statehood. The stamp was designed by Ethel Kessler of Bethesda, Maryland, and features a photograph by Richard Hamilton Smith of Park Rapids, Minnesota. The photograph shows a view northwest of the city of Winona. The view shows the foreground of MN-34/WI-54 bridge spanning the main channel of the Mississippi. The islands above the bridge are part of the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge, which extends 261 miles along the Mississippi from Wabasha, MN to Rock Island, IL.



Natalie and her husband, Matt, recently moved back to the metro area from Kansas City, MO. They just purchased a home in Wayzata, MN and will be moving in July.




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

Understanding geeks

PEBCAK: Problem exists between chair and keyboard (i.e., it's your fault, stupid).


PICNIC: Problem in chair, not in computer.
